The beautiful liturgical season of Advent is here to help us prepare prayerfully for Christmas.

Some countries still celebrate the feast of Mary's Expectation on December 18th. What must Mary have been feeling as her time drew near? You who are mothers would have some idea and be able to answer this question from your own experience. What a richness that would be if only we could hear your responses. I am sure that there would be many thoughts and feelings in common.

We may not know exactly what Our Lady was feeling and thinking during those precious waiting days, but, like all mothers, I am sure that Mary would have been longing to gaze upon the face of her Babe. What would the Son of God, flesh of her flesh, look like? We know that He would have looked very much like His dear Mother, as He had no earthly father.

Imagine Mary gazing into the eyes of God incarnate, her newly born Son. There is something so open and trusting about any baby's gaze that goes straight to our hearts and evokes an immediate response of love. How much more so when Jesus gazes at Mary for the very first time, and Mary gazes at Jesus! A newborn can see clearly for about 8", just enough to see its mother's face. It has no sense of itself apart from its mother for the first year because its whole identity is intricately entwined with hers. One mother has written:

> "I would think Jesus went through this same stage of development. No wonder Mary is the Mediatrix of All Graces. she soaked up the love of God as she nursed and held the newborn Jesus and now she simply allows this Divine Love to flow back through her to us." (Melanie lur

At the Annunciation Mary gave her whole-hearted "Yes" to co-operate in God's plan for the Incarnation. She lived this "Yes" throughout her life, as she brought the Christ Child to birth, and with Joseph prepared him for life, her loving gaze always upon him. She farewelled him as he went to proclaim the wonders of the Good News and she was there, gazing at his mangled body, when he died.

What thoughts were hers as God's plan for our salvation began unfolding in the birth of Jesus?

Perhaps a poet can best answer this question as he reflects on Mary wrapping Jesus in swaddling clothes and laying him in the manger:

" Her first gift to Him, and His first witness to the ways of earth, the first of tribute, and the gesture that began the long fulfillment was a simple care she brought to him, not as a creature comes to stoop, but as a mother bends to love. We know no more that this, and what exchange beyond lies gathered to the spaces of her heart to turn forever there, inviolate." John W Lynch, A Woman Wrapped in Silence, Paulist press, NY.1941. P44

St Luke tells us that *"Mary kept all these things, treasuring them and pondering them in her heart."* (2:19). During these days before Christmas let us imitate our dear Mother, Our Lady of the Sacred Heart, and treasure the many blessings God has bestowed on us through his Son, and our brother, Jesus.

Here is a beautiful invitation from Our Lady, as we live our Advent with her:



If you want, the Virgin will come walking down the road pregnant with the Holy and say,

"I need shelter for the night, please take me inside your heart, my time is so close."

Then, under the roof of your soul, you will witness the sublime intimacy, the divine, the Christ, taking birth forever, as she grasps your hand for help, for each of us is the midwife of God, each of us. Yes there, under the dome of our being does creation come into existence eternally, through your womb, dear pilgrim – the sacred womb of your soul, as God grasps our arms for help: for each of us is his beloved servant, never far. If you want, the Virgin will come walking down the street pregnant with Light and sing.

The following is a meditation on *Advent, Waiting and Sickness* written by Pope Emeritus Benedict XVI in December 2018.

A Very Personal Advent of One's Own

Let us reflect on what the word "Advent" actually means. The Latin word "adventus" can be translated as "presence" or "arrival". In the vocabulary of classical antiquity, it was a technical term for the arrival of a high official and especially for the arrival of kings or emperors in a province. It could, however, also express the arrival of a deity who emerged from hiddenness and gave proof of his presence through mighty works or a god whose presence was solemnly celebrated in a cultic act.

The Christians adopted this word in order to express their special relationship to Jesus Christ. For Christians, he was the King who had entered this wretched province, Earth, and bestowed on it the gift of his visit; and they believed that he was present in the liturgical assembly. In general terms, when they used this word, they intended to say :

> God is here. He has not withdrawn from the world. He has not left us alone. Although we cannot see him and take hold of him as we do with objects in this world, nevertheless he is here, and he comes to us in many ways.

Accordingly, the word "visitation" is closely connected to the meaning of the word "Advent". This means "visit", but our ecclesiastical language has long been accustomed to translate it as "visitation". And a strange shift in our thinking has occurred here; the word "visitation" has almost completely lost the joyful contents of the word "visit". We no longer think of its original meaning, rather we think of "visitations" as burdens and labours that we interpret as a punishment "visited upon us" by God. But the opposite ought in fact to be the

case! The word "visitation" (or "visit") ought to help us perceive that even hard things may contain something of the beauty of Advent.

Just like a great joy, so too illness and suffering can be a very personal Advent of one's own – a visit by the God who enters my life and wants to encounter me personally. Even when it is difficult for us, we should at least try to understand the days of our illness in this way: the Lord has interrupted my activity for a time in order to let me be still.

In my daily living, I have little time for him and little time for myself. I am completely involved from morning to evening in all the things I have to do, and I even succeed in eluding my own grasp, because I do not know how to be alone with myself. My job possesses me; the society in which I live possesses me; entertainment of various kinds possess me; but I do not possess myself. And this means that I gradually go to seed like an overgrown garden, first in my external activities and then, in my inner life, too. I am propelled along by my activities, for I am merely a cog in their great machine.

But now God has drawn me out of this. I am obliged to be still. I am obliged to wait. I am obliged to reflect on myself; I am obliged to bear being alone. I am obliged to bear pain, and I am obliged to accept the burden of my own self. All this is hard.

But may it not be the case that God is waiting for me in this stillness? May it not be the case that he is doing here what Jesus says in the parable of the vine: *"Every branch that does not bear fruit he prunes, that it may bear more fruit"* (Jn 15:2)? If I learn to accept myself in these days of stillness, if I accept the pain, because the Lord is using it to purify me – does this not make me richer than if I had earned a lot of money? Has not something happened to me that is more durable and fruitful than all those things that can be counted and calculated?

A visit by the Lord – perhaps illness can present itself in a new light when we see it as a part of Advent. For when we rebel against it, this is not only because it is painful or because it is hard to be still and alone: we rebel against it because there are so many important things we ought to be doing and because illness seems meaningless. But it is not in the least meaningless! In the structure of human life as a whole, it is profoundly meaningful. It can be a moment in our life that belongs to God, a time when we are open to him and thus learn to rediscover our own selves.

Perhaps we should try an experiment. Let us understand the individual events of day as little signs God sends us. Let us not take note only of the annoying and unpleasant thins; we should endeavour to see how often God lets us feel something of his love. To keep a kind of inner diary of good things would be a beautiful and healing task.

The Lord is here. This Christian certainty is meant to help us look at the world with new eyes and to understand the "visitation" as a visit, as one way in which he can come to us and be close to us.

Vale Sister Theresa Coleman fdnsc

Our much-loved Sr Theresa Coleman died suddenly at St Joseph's Aged Care Facility, Kensington, on Tuesday 8th November. Her gentle and wise presence was always appreciated in any situation. After many years in the secondary school educational apostolate, Theresa began to work with the OLSH Associates in small ways at first, but then in 1994 she

arranged a pilgrimage for the Associates to Issoudun. Thus began her close involvement with the Associates over many years – fruitful for her and extremely fruitful for the Associates. She compiled informative booklets on the lives of Father Chevalier and Mother Marie Louise and the places relating to their lives that the pilgrims would be visiting. Such was the success of the first pilgrimage that it was decided to have another one in 1998 and a third in 2001. In the years following Theresa was very involved in all aspects of the Associates' movement. She led the Randwick group until her health failed and she began the final chapter of her life at St Joseph's. Hopefully Theresa's Mass Eulogy will be in the next *Ametur*. Meanwhile the Randwick Associates have written their own eulogy to their former beloved leader. Our sympathy is with the Randwick Group as the Associates mourn their last two leaders in a matter of months, as Sr Terie died in June.

Pope extends Synod on Synodality to 2024

The updated Synod on Synodality logo expresses the new dates (Vatican News)

Pope Francis announced yesterday that the Synod of Bishops on Synodality will be extended by a year, with the assembly meetings to be held in Rome over two sessions in October 2023 and October 2024. Source: *CNA*.

Pope Francis explained that he made the decision to hold the scheduled October 2023 assembly over two sessions with a year in between "in order to have a more relaxed period of discernment".

"The fruits of the synodal process under way are many, but so that they might come to full maturity, it is necessary not to be in a rush," he said.

"I trust that this decision will promote the understanding of synodality as a constitutive dimension of the Church and help everyone to live it as the journey of brothers and sisters who proclaim the joy of the Gospel." .

The two sessions of the XVI Ordinary General Assembly of the Synod of Bishops will take place on October 4-29, 2023, and in October 2024, bringing together bishops from across the world to discuss and prepare a document to counsel the Pope.

Pope Francis launched the Synod on Synodality in October 2021 as a worldwide undertaking during which Catholics were encouraged to submit feedback to their local dioceses.

The Church's massive multi-year synodal process has been divided into stages. The initial diocesan listening phase concluded with the participation of 112 out of 114 of the world's Catholic bishops' conferences, according to the General Secretariat of the Synod of Bishops.

The second, continental phase is taking place from September 2022 to March 2023. In this stage, Continental Synodal Assemblies will be convened between January and March of next year.

The final, universal phase will begin with the XVI Ordinary General Assembly of the Synod of Bishops at the Vatican in October 2023 and continue in October 2024.
