

You put together the broken pieces and make with God a work of art;
You dare to love despite the grief;
You discover, within your winter, a summer-time that never ends;
You hold the earth and all people as you hold the hearts of those you love;
You trust in dawn at the darkest hour;
You accept your weakness and it makes you strong.

As we live out our Charism of making Jesus' Sacred Heart known and loved everywhere, and particularly in our own milieu, we could measure our heart's health in the light of Daniel's Easter heart. The Persian poet, Hafiz, describes our vocation in another way in this beautiful poem:

Listen to the Music

I am a hole in a flute that the Christ's beath moves through — listen to this music.

I am the concert from the movement of every creature singing in myriad chords.



And every dancer, their foot I know and lift. And every brush and hand, well, that's me too, who caresses any canvas or cheek.

How did I become all these things, and beyond all things!

It was my desire, as it is ours. My poems are about our glorious journey.

We are a hole in a flute, a moment in space, that the Christ's body can move through and sway, all forms – in an exquisite dance – as the wind in a forest.

CHEVALIER, IN HIS TIME ...

His Life: Jules Chevalier was born on 15th March 1824 in the small town of Richelieu, France. Jules was the third child of Jean-Charles, who was a rough but kindly man, and Louise Ory, a devout lady. He shares: "Soon after my christening my mother took me to church and dedicated me to the Blessed Virgin and to the Sacred Heart of Jesus" (Personal Notes, 3).

His Words: "... it is through love that God created everything; the atom, that nothingness. God loved it with an eternal love just as he loved the angels" (SCJ 302). For Fr. Chevalier, "every creature is a word of God" (SCJ 329). In every creature he hears a "... word of love", and if he wants to improve his knowledge of God, he has to explore everything carefully. His prayer is contemplation, and he hears a voice whispering and reassuring: "Do not be afraid... little atom ... you are a word of God, a written word ... and God would delete this word? ... No! God deletes nothing; what God says is well said, and it is said for eternity" (SCJ 303).

In our time, we hear the sentiments of Fr. Chevalier again in Pope Francis when he said, "Together with our obligation to use the earth's goods responsibly, we are called to recognize that other beings have a value of their own in God's eyes: ... by their mere existence they bless him and give him glory and indeed, '... the Lord rejoices in all his works' (Ps 104:31). The Catechism clearly and forcefully criticizes a distorted anthropocentrism: 'Each creature possesses its own particular goodness and perfection. Each of the various creatures, willed in its own being, reflects in its own way a ray of God's infinite wisdom and goodness. Man must therefore respect the particular goodness of every creature, to avoid any disordered use of things '" (Laudato Si', 69).

How about you? What do you see when you look at creation? What do you hear when you listen to the sounds of nature?

If we recognise that every creature is "a word of love" from God, how are we called to relate with creation?

Listening to Fr. Chevalier and Pope Francis, how are we invited to care more for the earth, our common home?




PRAYER FOR THE MONTH ...

CHEVALIER IN HIS TIME ...

His Life So, on after finishing primary school, Jules indicated he wanted to become a priest. "My mother explained that their lack of money … would prevent them from supporting me in this and advised me to take up an apprenticeship. After a lot of crying, I said to my mother in a resolute way: 'All right! I'll take up a trade if I must, but as soon as I have some savings I'll go and knock on some convent's door …' " (Personal Notes).

His words: "In the human person, matter becomes religious. The person's nature is to be a symphony ... made up of the diverse forms of life: Not only is a human person a flowering mineral, but a bush which can feel, an animal that can reason, the person is a mineral, a tree, an animal who prays, who adores, who gives thanks: in us matter becomes religious (SCJ 64).

"The human person's life," says Chevalier in a profound way, "is a song for two voices. In us and through us, God speaks and sings of Godself, out of Godself, and God wants us to speak of God and to sing of God" (SHJ 326). That's why God made us intelligent, loving and free.

CHEVALIER FOR TODAY ...



Chevalier is aware of it: he too is a "word" of God. Therefore, he insists on saying "his word", the word that no one else will be saying for him. (See Fifteen Days, Second Day). Today, 200 years after his birth, we thank Chevalier not only for saying "his word" but also for passing it on to generations and generations of people, men and women, priests, religious and lay united around his charism. And what was "his word"? What was the "note" he sang over and over again? "We are loved by God!" ... "We are loved by God!" ... "We are loved by God!"

How about you? You too are a word of God. What is "your word"? What is the "note" that you are called to sing? Spend time to listen to God's call once again for you. What is the mission that God has given you? How are you called to continue singing and enriching Fr Chevalier's word: "We are loved by God"?

But I will sing it solo; it will be mine;


And this will be one more harmony in the universal concert!

CHEVALIER IN HIS TIME ...

His Life: When Jules was seventeen he entered the minor seminary of Saint-Gaultier (Indre) and shifted without difficulty to the major seminary of Bourges (Cher) in 1846. He was a serious student, quite strict in his practice of his faith. One day, thanks to an exceptional teacher, he discovered the Heart of Christ. For him it was "... like a new vision of God ... bathed in resplendent light and colours ... illuminating his whole life as he was discovering the Heart of Christ . It was the vision and the inspiration of his life and of all his achievement..." (A New Heart, A New Spirit, E J Cuskelly msc p.24)

His Words:

Appear, Sun of all suns,
Light of the world, living light;
beginning and end,
our God and our all!
Jesus, Jesus,
appear with all the splendours
of your adorable Heart, that nucleus of love,
that source of life, of grace and of blessings.

From the tiny atom to humankind, Chevalier has advanced in the direction of "God's Heart". What a revelation!

CHEVALIER FOR TODAY ...



This refreshing revelation of the face of God came to him providentially at a time when he was worried about the salvation of the world on account of its indifference. Here, he became acutely aware that "... while Jesus was on earth, he gladly bestowed all the tenderness of His Heart upon the little ones, upon the humble, upon the poor, upon suffering humanity. The sight of misery ... touched His Heart with compassion: (Meditations, Vol 2,3).

Fr Chevalier's discovery of the Sacred Heart radically changed him, and like Jesus, the sight of misery touched his heart with compassion, and he responded concretely. How about you? How is the Heart of Christ changing you?

Where we are in different parts of the world we see "misery" all around us.

Close your eyes for a moment, and with the eyes of your heart, look at the misery that surrounds you and name it.

How are you, as individuals and communities, responding to the misery that you see?

In those who have nothing to eat;


In those whose voices are not heard;

CHEVALIER IN HIS TIME ...

His Life: In the major seminary, Jules tried to live a spiritual life. In his effort, he had become serious and taciturn in his relations with others. After Jules discovered the Sacred heart as the Good Shepherd in particular, Christ appeared to him to be "the very last word" (SCJ 76). Since that day, Chevalier seemed more relaxed and smiling. "... and still today, after fifty years, we find him always good, compassionate, and amiable towards all who approach him. He has become all things to all men to gain all for Jesus Christ" (Charles Piperon, **Writings on the Life of the Founder**, 34).

His Words: Jesus then comes to earth to fulfill His mission; he will only follow His Heart. A word would have been enough, but He questions His Heart and His Heart answers that, to express more love, He would have to be born a tiny child in a stable, poor and needy ... (Ftes MR 35).

From the beginning of time, Chevalier tells us: "God [...] planned to reveal God's love to us" (SCJ 3) and adds, "The Son of God ... appeared amongst us with a Heart filled with compassion, love and mercy" (SCJ 209).

CHEVALIER FOR TODAY ...



As soon as Jesus was conceived in Mary's virginal womb His human Heart was grafted straightaway on to the adorable person of the Divine Word. Jesus makes us God-like by uniting our nature to His; He gives us His gifts, His graces, His friendship. "Through Him we possess the Heart of God ... " (M1,120). The incarnation is still growing until all will be one body, of which Christ will be the head (says St Paul), or the heart, adds Chevalier: " ... the Heart of Jesus is not only the Heart of His holy humanity but also the heart of the Church, her mystical body ... a real body of which we are the members; each one of us can truly say to this divine Heart: 'You are my Heart' " (SCJ 81).

What are you listening to in your heart?

Today everywhere, Jesus invites all hearts to be like His Heart, especially under the tender guidance of His Mother, Our Lady of the Sacred Heart. He keeps calling: "Come, follow me, the beloved of my Father!" Let us listen to our hearts attentively. In what way is Jesus calling your heart continuously to be the incarnated Heart of Jesus in your relation ship with others in your daily living?

How are you responding in concrete ways to this particular call of Jesus for you?

Feast of Our Lady of the Sacred Heart

By the Church's arrangement, this feast is celebrated on the last Saturday in May. So, for 1977, May 28th is our own very special day for honouring our Blessed Mother. It will be a day on which we will listen with deepest gratitude and attentiveness to Jesus' personal word to each of us: "Behold your Mother!" Our Associate effort for May, directed to seeing the will of her Son in the events of every day, will have given us something of our Mother's joy and serenity, as well as a deeper understanding of God's love and wisdom in His plans for us covering every moment of everyday. What Janet Stuart once wrote of Our Lady's joy can have real meaning for us in these last days of her month. "Our Lady's joy should be ours because she gave us JOY itself, God her divine Son. But she is our joy, too, in herself. The thought of Our Lady, simply resting in our minds, gives steadiness to our joy. We need not even think ABOUT her, just think OF her. And now the month of June is nearly with us. It comes with all the strength, all the warmth and tenderness, appeal and challenge that the words, 'Sacred Heart of Jesus' bring to our hearts. Our plan for the month will centre around our Associate call to be the heart of Christ in the world for others. Our chief aim will be to communicate His understanding, sympathy, forgiveness and graciousness to others – those with whom we live, those with whom we come in contact. He himself will give us the circumstances and opportunities in which we can be the channel of His love for others and thereby lead them to experience that "God is love".

Our daily Scripture reading will be an important help here. We will concentrate of St Matthew, Chapters 5,6 and 7. Our Lady will be our guide in understanding her Son's attitudes and values as, like her, we ponder his words and keep them in our hearts.

Everywhere! Forever!



Our Provincial, Sr Philippa Murphy, recently spent time with our Sisters in the Philippines and shared with us the highlights of her visit. I am sure you will be inspired as you read of how our Sisters with their Associates and Partners on Mission are being the Heart of God to our less fortunate sisters and brothers.

Philippines Visitation Report

May 24th - June 15th, 2023

Dear Sisters,

I have recently returned from a life-giving visit to the Philippines. Upon arrival, I received a warm welcome. And I attended the Silver Jubilee Celebrations of Srs Emma, Cetah, and Merle which was a wonderful, joyful occasion. The following day, I facilitated a Mini Assembly which was an enriching experience. The day ending with a rousing rendition of 'Hearts on Fire with the Love of Jesus'.

Srs Emma, Cetah and Merle chose as the theme for their Jubilee: 'the Almighty has done great things ... Holy is His name'. As I visited each community in the Philippines these profound words of Mary's Magnificat echoed in my heart: " The Almighty has done great things... Holy is God's name."

During my time of visitation, I was privileged to listen to the sisters' stories of family, of ministries, of struggles and joys. Our Filipina Sisters have been through many challenges these past years, with COVID, Typhoons, family struggles, illness and aging. I was humbled at their gracious acceptance of their reality. Their focus remains on caring for the most vulnerable in their midst, including one another. What motivates them each day is their love for the Heart of Jesus and Our Lady of the Sacred Heart. This is manifested in their deep love for one another despite their many differences.

On Monday I began my formal visitation. My first stop was Munoz where I visited Srs Irene Datig and Betty, both of whom are ministering to the people of the Sacred Heart Parish. Irene is the Parish Secretary and is kept busy with the numerous weddings, baptisms, and day-to-day tasks as the parish secretary. She is meticulous and ensures all the records are up to date. Betty is in the field, working in catechesis and supporting members of the Chevalier family. Betty is innovative and creative and has many ideas to share with her Church community. Both these Sisters have a passion for living our mission of God's love. There is much evidence in the community of being guided by the inspiration of Pope Francis in Laudato Si.

We had the opportunity to visit our old convent at Munoz and San Sebastian Catholic School. It was inspiring to hear the stories about our Pioneer sisters from some of the elderly people in Munoz. They particularly remembered Srs Joan Clarke, Lydia and Precy, not just because they taught them well but because of who they were: kind women who listened attentively and spoke to them with gentleness and respect.

My next stop was Manila to visit the community at Hartzer House where Srs Leda, Marivic, Rosalia, Irene Munsayac, Regina, Connie, Hayashi San and Naty are members of this community. Sr Rosalia continues to be an inspiration celebrating her 90th birthday next year. She spends countless hours making beautiful cards, bookmarks and is attentive to the Sisters. Sr Naty is passionate about liturgy; she prepared and led the community prayers with reverence and thoughtfulness. She will turn 80 this year. These elderly sisters are an inspiration and wisdom figures for the Region. Sr Leda is the current community leader but will soon be replaced by Sr Marivic. These Sisters work tirelessly to support and assist the Sisters in the community. Leda has been responsible for the secretarial work of the Region and the day-to-day tasks, including overseeing the staff. Sr Marivic will continue in this role, as well as assist with the care of Srs Irene Munsayac and Reggie, who are both suffering from cognitive and health decline. It is a blessing that Sr Hayashi San Akie from Japan is living and ministering with the Sisters at Hartzer House. She has a background in aged care and health which is a great need in the Region at this time. She generously shares her skills in the support and care of our Sisters. Sr Connie is also in the community at Hartzer. She can help out in various household duties including the garden, she is passionate about Laudato Si and collects plastics to build eco bricks. In this community there are also sisters from Indonesia, Burkina Faso and Papua New Guinea who are studying. Whenever I visit the sisters here, a highlight for me is to experience our international family and intercultural living. It reminds me of the richness of our charism, as well as giving me a deeper realisation of what it means to be a Daughter of Our Lady of the Sacred Heart on mission.

After visitation at Hartzer House, Ruth and I packed our bags and walked the short distance from Hartzer House to Ermin Garcia. This was our Camino experience. Ermin is the formation community for the Region. I'm pleased that sisters Merle and Carmen have joined this community. Sr Sally Amodia also stays there as she prepares for her mission in Angola. Merle is now employed as the sabbatical coordinator at East Asian Pastoral Institute. I was delighted to have the opportunity to go to the place where she ministers and meet the staff with whom she will be working. Merle brings many gifts to her new role, especially her enthusiasm and rich experience of living interculturally. She will live in at the EAPI and return to Ermin on weekends. Carmen is a gentle, kind presence in the formation house and her various gifts of listening, gentleness, and being a gifted seamstress will enrich this community. Sr Precy is always open to the needs of the Province and Region; she selflessly carries her role as Postulant Formator with the spirit of graciousness and openness to God's spirit. Her wisdom is appreciated.

We have two young women in formation. Nina Rose and Sheila May. Both of these young women are open to all that is involved in the invitation of Jesus 'to come and see.' We assure them of our prayers

Whilst at Ermin and I had the privilege to visit Matantubig joining the Postulants as they supported the tutoring program offered to the small children whom I have visited on numerous occasions. It was wonderful to see the people with very little in terms of resources, ready to welcome me and invite me into their home. I was very moved by the simplicity and the willingness of these poor ones to share their stories. I felt blessed by these friends of Jesus.

The following day Ruth and I travelled by plane to Cebu. Cebu is beautiful with many dotted islands and clear skies. I visited the SACS Community in Lapu Lapu City. The students were on vacation. I was pleased I had the opportunity to spend some time at SACS with the staff, where I lead them in a session on heart spirituality and self-care. The school is one of the best schools in the whole region having achieved level three status which is the highest status of any school. It was wonderful to be with them again as some of them had visited Australia. Sr Emma works diligently as the director of this three-campus school, Sr Marjory is an enthusiastic Principal of the Grade and High Schools. Sr Narie is the School Registrar. She was kept busy and remained patient as many families were lined up hoping to enrol their child at SACS. Sr Dove works as the School Treasurer with sensitivity and kindness.

Srs Emma, Marjory, Narie and Dove, work tirelessly to support the staff, students, and parents of SACS. No matter what their role is in this excellent School, they carry out their duties with kindness, compassion, and love. These Sisters are a witness to the SACS community of woman alive on mission, united by their common goal to bring the love of the heart of Jesus to people everywhere. I was grateful for the outing they organised where I had the opportunity to swim with the whale sharks, a memorable experience.

I spent one afternoon, with Sr Ruth, the SCAS and Cordova communities visiting a community at Mactan seaside impacted by typhoon Odette. I had visited this community last year. The purpose of the trip was to see the growth of the mangroves planted by the Sisters. The mangroves protect those who live in very basic housing on the coast. It was wonderful to see these poor people impacted by the typhoon rebuilding their lives with the love and support of our Sisters.

From here Ruth and I packed our bags to continue our Camino journey to Cordova. Cetah is principal of a 'boutique' kindergarten with 18 students, OLSHies. The enrolments have been impacted by COVID and the recent introduction of K-12 schools in the area. The Sisters are looking at creative ways to increase the enrolments. Cetah has decorated the classroom beautifully, displaying the students work in a colourful and educational workplace.

Cordova has a magnificent garden and Sr Cha along with Olive, a young woman who lives and works with the sisters, are responsible for planting, pruning and the upkeep of the garden. Sr Cha calls the garden her pharmacy as it has many fruits, herbs and plants to aid in a variety of health conditions. A highlight of this visit was the blessing of the shrine of Our Lady of the Sacred Heart made with eco bricks. It was a work of love, involving many people from SACS and the local parish. It was lovely the Associates could join us for the blessing of the shrine and the beautiful prayer prepared by Cetah and Cha.

Our next stop was Surigao where we were greeted by Sr Cathie and five young women who are exploring ways to share our OLSH Charism and life. One of these women is an Architect who works with Sr Cathie to support the Badjoa - a poor, displaced, Indigenous tribe who live over the ocean with homes raised on stilts. Cathy is involved in the social action centre for the diocese and represents the Badjoa people on radio and social media. Her pleasant personality and hard work have endeared these 'poorest of the poor' to her.

Sisters, during my time in the Philippines I felt I should remove my shoes, for surely, I was standing on holy ground. I was very conscious of our pioneer Sisters in the Philippines, and their spirit of kindness, generosity, hospitality and tenderness. A spirit that is still evident in the lives of our Sisters in the Philippine Region today.

I would like to thank the Regional Councillors, Srs Precy and Merle for their generous service to the Region. I would especially like to thank Sr Ruth Yburan, the Regional Leader for ensuing my visit was well organised, enriching, and comfortable. My accommodation was very comfortable, and the food was delicious, including the Caribou milk, cheese and tilapia (fish) ice cream - a memorable experience.

I especially enjoyed our fun nights and sharing stories and life. I thank Ruth for her gentle leading of the Region, and the care, kindness, and encouragement she shows the sisters, especially the elderly. Once again, I thank the Sisters for their warm hospitality, generosity, kindness, love and welcome. Thank you, Sisters, for the many and varied ways you are women of Heart on Mission, bringing the love of Jesus and Our Lady of the Sacred Heart, to the people of the Philippines. Be assured on my prayers and support as you met the ever-changing needs and challenges of the Region.

As we approach our 150th anniversary of the Congregation let us continue to be inspired by our pioneer Sisters, and united in our common call as Daughters of Our Lady of the Sacred Heart, to be attentive to the needs of the poor.

Chris McDermott will be working in the Asia Pacific region. Chris' role will be to:


- Organise two Zoom meetings with member countries in the region
