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Dear Associates,

So much has happened in our Chevalier Family over the past weeks! The most recent was a Recollection Weekend at Burradoo for the Associates. With springtime weather and amid the beauties of the Hartzer Park gardens Sr Dain Inglis olsh prayerfully led us through a reflection on the words from Isaiah 40:4

"Each morning he awakens me to hear, to listen like a disciple".

Here is a beautiful quotation from Father Chevalier:

"Before being an apostle one must first be a disciple, a disciple ... of the Heart of Jesus."

Sister Dain reminded us of the difference between a disciple and an apostle. The disciple is a learner, a listener, sitting at the feet of the master. The disciple listens closely to the master, drinking in every word, reflecting on whatever comes from the master's lips. The disciple longs to be like the master.

As disciples of Jesus, we also sit at the feet of our beloved Master, as Mary did in the story of Mary and Martha in their home at Bethany (Luke 10:38). We let Him speak to us, not in audible words or in any way of the senses, but in the depths of our hearts. We take time out to be with him and to learn from His heart. We are silent with Him as we listen attentively with the ears of our hearts.

Sister Dain has kindly given me permission to use some of her material and so the following is taken from her reflection notes:

"To be a truly listening disciples means:

<u>Firstly,</u> that we must deepen our attentiveness to the word of God in the Bible, to the sacraments and to the life of the Body of Christ [the Church].

<u>Secondly</u>, it means learning a level of attentiveness to all persons, places and things, looking at everything with the eye of expectancy, waiting for something of God to blossom with it. It means being in Christ's company, learning attentiveness from him, and practising that kind of still alertness that it is looking and waiting for the light to break through.

<u>Thirdly</u>, it means being attentive to where Christ is going and keeping company with those He welcomes, among them we will find the most unexpected and unlikely people, the kind of people that Jesus seems to spend so much time with, in the gospels and also today.

<u>Fourthly,</u> and most importantly, we will find Him keeping company with the Father, in whose company He is, always and forever.

As a listening disciple, we have to grow into a "mature stillness" and an openness to others and the world, that can allow the transformative action of God to come through. This will change us, our immediate environment, our world."

Thank you to Sr Dain for the wonderful weekend and for sharing these thoughts with us all. The quote from Isaiah has long been one of my favourite texts from Scripture, and I have often thought that it would be a good idea to write it on a piece of paper and pin it to the sheet so that I am reminded of it each morning as I awake. Sister Dain also reminded us that whether we arise in sorrow or in joy we can still begin each new day knowing that God's Holy Spirit is with us, and in the words of the poet Kahlil Gibran:

"I arise at dawn with a winged heart and give thanks for another day of loving."

Mary, Our Mother, Our Lady of the Sacred Heart, was the first Apostle of the Sacred Heart. She learnt the lessons of discipleship from her deep motherly relationship with her Son. She will teach us. One of our Community Prayers expresses this beautifully:

Mary, our Mother and life-long companion, stay close to us so that we may be true disciples of the Heart of your Son. Amen.

Lay Gathering and Commissioning of the Australian National Council of the Laity of the Chevalier Family

13th – 15th September 2019 St Mary's Towers Retreat Centre, Douglas Park

This eagerly awaited event of which you have all heard so much in the past months, did not disappoint our expectations. It was a truly wonderful gathering of the Chevalier Family with representatives from Father Chevalier's three religious families and the Laity associated with them in so many and diverse ways. What a joy and privilege it was to spend the weekend with people who were all intent on being the Heart of Christ to the world! The final paragraph of Mary Thorne's article, *Ministering is at the Heart of Christianity*, (published in the last Ametur and reflected on during our weekend together) provides a fitting comment on the mood of the group as we dispersed at the conclusion of the weekend:

"In 2019, God's people are an adult people.

We are ready, willing and able to do God's work in a world beset by crises.

For us, MINISTER is a verb.

God has no favourites, we are diverse beyond imagining but we are equal, and we know without a shadow of a doubt, that we must minister first to the most broken and vulnerable and distressed, no matter what the cost to status or reputation."

The weekend was facilitated by Alison McKenzie and the following is an inspiring and informative account of the weekend. I thank Alison for kindly allowing this to be reproduced in our Newsletter.

Many Hearts United as One

After many months of diligent and prayerful work by a steering committee composed of lay and professed

members of the FDNSC and MSC family, a document of National Guiding Principles to underpin the establishment and operation of the National Council of the Laity of the Chevalier Family, was released over the weekend and the Australian Council members were blessed and commissioned during the final liturgy. The preamble to the Guiding Principles describes the identity of the National Council of the Laity of the Chevalier Family as: "... a private association of the Christian Faithful (Canon 215), motivated by and consistent with 'General Guiding Principles and Statutes of the Laity of the Chevalier Family'. These Guiding Principles were approved by the gathering of Laity of the Chevalier Family, Sao Paulo, Brazil, July 2017. The document also elaborates the Vision of the National Council:



- To look for ways to support and encourage growth of Spirituality of the Heart. This may be through outreach to past students, to parishioners with/without previous connections of Spirituality of the Heart and other newer areas of evangelisation and apostolate where people associated with MSC/FDNSC/MSC Sisters charisms are involved.
- To represent all members of the Laity of the Chevalier Family but not every group will have a member on the Council
- To seek to ensure that all members of the Laity of the Chevalier Family are communicated with and their views represented in matters considered by the Council.
- Members have the right and are encouraged to co-opt expertise outside the Council to assist in this
 process.
- To acknowledge and endorse the administration of each of the aforementioned groups as considered appropriate.

Close to 60 people gathered at St. Mary's Towers, Douglas Park for the weekend. This was a historical moment in the life of the Australian Chevalier Family as the laity associated with the MSC, FDNSC and the MSC sisters came together in a retreat that recollected and celebrated our shared history and affirmed our shared charism as people of the Sacred Heart. The image and symbol of a loaf of bread being created was be the thread that tied the retreat together and became the bread we broke and shared at Eucharist.

We articulated our particular spirit as lived by lay people deeply immersed in a troubled but beautiful world as being guided by the following principles:

We must work together to find language and symbol and metaphor that describes our lay experience of God's love.

We must be alert to the possibility of God's call in the lives of our friends and families and not be afraid to suggest that the spirit may be moving in that persons' life.

We must develop relevant and accessible rituals that enable secular people, who may not connect with the institutional church, to give expression to their longings and to deepen their experience of God.

We must form open and welcoming communities, that actively seek to do as Chevalier said: to answer the needs of the people of our time.

We must engage deeply with the Eucharistic and Sacramental structures of our church, but be brave enough to recognise that God's spirit is not restricted to those places, and our call as a Eucharistic people is to be deeply fed and nourished, so we can leave the four walls and go out into the hungry and suffering world, as Jesus did.

At the centre of it all must be a focus on Jesus of the Gospels and his call to us, and on the imperative to develop a deep and personal life of prayer – however we can in our lay lives. The sisters and the priests and brothers have a Novitiate which teaches them to pray and a community life that fosters the on-going practice of prayer. We can do nothing unless we find our own way of deep, daily prayer – and that usually means some form of silent presence to God.

Perhaps these words will begin the discernment towards a set of Constitutions for the Laity of the Chevalier Family.

MEETING REPORTS

Alice Springs: At our August Meeting we began with Paul Gurr's hymn, *The Lord Delights,* followed by a reflection on Mary. We are looking forward to the unveiling of the Missionaries of the Sacred Heart and the Daughters of Our Lady of the Sacred Heart Memorial Window on October 12 and the Golden Jubilee Mass on 13th October.

We met on Our Lady's Birthday and began by looking at the many roles of Mary – daughter, cousin, wife and mother – and the experiences she had throughout her life. Sr Kathleen provided readings from various sources such as *Laudato Si*, Jules Chevalier and *That Wound was Necessary* (from MSC Anniversary Novena), for each of the decades of the Rosary. We concluded with a discussion about the newsletter, *Encounter of Hearts* and our own parish activities for the Jubilee celebrations.

Bentleigh: 18 of us met at the Convent on 27th July and we had a special guest, Sr Wendy OLSH, who works in Southern Sudan, and Sr Mary Batchelor once worked there with her. The theme of the day was the 50th anniversary of the Apollo 11 moon landing on 20th July 1969. We recounted the great faith of these three men and their desire for peace for all mankind. Pope Paul V1 was able to give them a special blessing on landing on the moon. All the world was united at that moment. We then went on to talk about what other things are "awesome" in our lives. He soon found that Marie Louise was a woman of deep faith and love. He asked her to lead the newly found Congregation and she soon proved herself to be an inspiring and capable leader. She claimed that all she knew was "how to make a home" and she did this with great love, uniting the Sisters in community and being especially helpful to those in the missions with her regular letters of advice, encouragement and motherly concern. She is a wonderful example for all of us.

Notre Dame: We met at Kensington Convent on 11th August and since it was only days since St Mary MacKillop's feast on 8th, Sr Ancilla led us in a prayerful reflection on the many similarities between Fr Chevalier and St Mary MacKillop. They had many beautiful spiritual gifts in common. We reflected on the humble beginnings of the two Congregations – Mary's in a disused stable and Jules' in a tumbledown barn disguised as a chapel. The Cross is something that played a large part in their lives. Mary wrote that "... the little crosses are harder to bear than the thumping big ones!" Jules experienced the Cross in his life in so many forms – he accepted them lovingly and found his inspiration in the pierced Heart of Jesus. They both accepted and embraced the Will of God and had a strong devotion to St Joseph. Mary placed her new religious family under his protection and Jules told his men to go to St Joseph with confidence. We are truly blessed to have these two wise and holy people for example and inspiration in our lives.

We then shared a reflection on the Gospel for 19th Sunday beautifully prepared by Judith. The Gospel is telling us to be alert and watchful. While the message may seem more appropriate to the Advent season, it is positioned in the middle of Luke's gospel and halfway through Jesus' journey to Jerusalem, thus reminding us to be alert so that we may recognize the Lord when He comes. His arrival will be as unexpected as a night thief. The Eucharist is the sacrament of vigilant hope that nourishes and strengthens us for service to the poor and marginalized, which is what we will be judged on when He comes – when I was hungry you gave

me to eat etc. On page 8 of the last Ametur there is a list of ordinary ways in which we can show Jesus to others. They are not mammoth actions, but ordinary things done in love. We can examine our own lives and see the small things that we often do to show the love of God to others. We can also see where we fail in these small everyday actions.

Our October reflection centred on praying for the Homeless. What can I do for the Homeless one might ask? Why do these, our brothers and sisters, have no place to live? Why are they homeless? We must remember that we will be judged on "Whatsoever you do to the least of my brothers you do to Me."

We pray: Lord God, You who so mysteriously call upon us to share in the sufferings of Christ, fill our hearts with compassion for those who lack the warmth of a home."

Judith then led us in our meditation and discussion for the 29th Sunday – the Ten Lepers. The theme of the Gospel is gratitude. We should put as much emphasis on gratitude as we do on petition. As one, the ten lepers call out for Jesus' mercy. He does not touch them, or raise his eyes to heaven, or pray over them. He gives them an instruction to go to the Jewish priest, and, as they leave they are healed. The only one to return and give thanks is a Samaritan, the race hated by the Jews! The Samaritan was the only one open to receive the salvation of Jesus even though His compassion was given to the ten. The healed one saw in Jesus the power and presence of God and threw himself at Jesus' feet and thanked Him. We, as disciples of Jesus, need to learn how to "see" and be moved with the compassion of Jesus and the gratitude of the Samaritan. After a lively discussion we said our closing prayer and had afternoon tea with the Sisters. **Maureen Maher**


Some Thoughts for Christmas

to bear in mind the things that other people have to bear in their hearts;

to try to understand what those who live in the same home with you really want, without waiting for them to tell you;

to trim your lamp so that it will give more light and less smoke, and to carry it in front so that your shadow will fall behind you;

to make a grave for your ugly thoughts, and a garden for your kindly feelings . . .

Are you willing to do these things, even for a day? Then you can keep Christmas.

Are you willing to believe that love is the strongest thing in the world—
stronger than hate, stronger than evil, stronger than death—
and that the blessed life which began in Bethlehem nineteen hundred years ago
is the image and brightness of the Eternal Love?

Then you can keep Christmas.

And if you can keep it for a day, why not always?

But you can never keep it alone.
